Thirtieth in Ordinary Time—Year C- 26th October 2025

Dear Brothers and Sisters "God, be merciful to me, a sinner."

In this Sunday's Gospel, Jesus tells a parable about two men who go up to the Temple to pray—one a Pharisee, the other a tax collector. The Pharisee stands tall and lists all the good things he does: fasting, tithing, living righteously. The tax collector, meanwhile, stands at a distance, unable even to lift his eyes to heaven. He beats his breast and prays a simple, heartfelt prayer: "God, be merciful to me, a sinner."

Jesus' conclusion surprises His listeners: it is the tax collector, not the Pharisee, who goes home justified before God. The difference is not in their actions but in their hearts. The Pharisee's prayer is filled with self-congratulation and comparison; he thanks God, yes, but only to draw attention to his own virtue and to judge another. The tax collector's prayer, on the other hand, is honest, humble, and rooted in a deep awareness of his need for God's mercy.

This parable reminds us that true prayer is not about presenting a résumé of our goodness before God but about coming before Him in truth. The humble heart attracts God's grace because it leaves room for Him to act. Pride, even when dressed in religious language, closes us off to the transforming power of God's mercy.

In our own spiritual lives, we may find traces of both men. Sometimes we fall into the Pharisee's temptation—comparing ourselves to others, measuring holiness by outward behaviour, or seeking approval for our faithfulness. Other times, we feel more like the tax collector—painfully aware of our failures and desperate for mercy. Jesus invites us to embrace the latter posture: a sincere humility that acknowledges both our weakness and our total dependence on God.

Every Mass gives us the opportunity to pray like the tax collector. Before receiving Communion, we say, "Lord, I am not worthy..." It is not false humility but a recognition that everything we are and have is God's gift. When we pray from the heart, not to impress but to be healed, we open ourselves to the joy of being justified—not by our own merit, but by God's boundless mercy. Amen




GOSPEL

Luke 18:9-14

Jesus spoke the following parable to some people who prided themselves on being virtuous and despised everyone else, 'Two men went up to the Temple to pray, one a Pharisee, the other a tax collector. The Pharisee stood there and said this prayer to himself, "I thank you, God, that I am not grasping, unjust, adulterous like the rest of mankind, and particularly that I am not like this tax collector here. I fast twice a week; I pay tithes on all I get." The tax collector stood some distance away, not daring even to raise his eyes to heaven; but he beat his breast and said, "God, be merciful to me, a sinner." This man, I tell you, went home again at rights with God; the other did not. For everyone who exalts himself will be humbled, but the man who humbles himself will be exalted.'

SECOND READING 2 Timothy 4:6-8, 16-18

My life is already being poured away as a libation, and the time has come for me to be gone. I have fought the good fight to the end; I have run the race to the finish; I have kept the faith; all there is to come now is the crown of righteousness reserved for me, which the Lord, the righteous judge, will give to me on that Day; and not only to me but to all those who have longed for his Appearing. The first time I had to present my defence, there was not a single witness to support me. Every one of them deserted me - may they not be held accountable for it. But the Lord stood by me and gave me power, so that through me the whole message might be proclaimed for all the pagans to hear; and so I was rescued from the lion's mouth. The Lord will rescue me from all evil attempts on me, and bring me safely to his heavenly kingdom. To him be glory for ever and ever. Amen.
