Dear Brothers and Sisters, The imitation of Christ

Today in the Gospel we can see that Jesus observes how guests at a banquet seek the places of honour and uses the moment to teach a powerful lesson about humility and hospitality. He challenges not just the social customs of his time but also the deeper attitudes of the heart that still speak to us today.

Jesus begins by addressing the desire for status and recognition. At first glance, it might seem like he's giving practical advice—don't sit at the best seat, in case someone more important arrives. But Jesus isn't promoting a false humility that still seeks recognition; rather, he invites us into a radically different way of living—one shaped by the values of the Kingdom of God, where the last are first, and true greatness is found in humble service.

Then, Jesus turns to the host and challenges him to rethink whom he invites to his table. Instead of friends, relatives, or wealthy neighbours who can return the favour, Jesus calls us to welcome "the poor, the crippled, the lame, and the blind." In doing so, he is not just speaking of physical condition, but those whom society often overlooks. This is the essence of Christian hospitality: opening our hearts and lives to those who cannot repay us, because that's how God loves us.

In this passage, we are reminded that Christian life isn't about climbing the social ladder or being seen as important. It's about imitating Christ, who "did not come to be served, but to serve" (Mark 10:45). True honour comes not from the approval of others, but from God, who sees what is done in secret and rewards us with eternal joy.

As a parish, we are invited to live this gospel by making room for the outsider, by honouring the dignity of each person, and by embracing humility—not as weakness, but as strength rooted in love. Let us build a community not of status -seeking, but of grace, welcome, and joyful service. Amen



SOCIAL JUSTICE SUNDAY— Signs of Hope on the Edge

The experience of people living with the challenges of homelessness and mental ill-health has been highlighted in the Australian *Catholic Bishops Conference's 2025 Social Justice Statement, Signs of Hope on the Edge.* Conference President, Archbishop Timothy Costelloe SDB, says in the foreword to the statement that homelessness and mental health services are stretched and underresourced, making it harder to provide adequate support for those who need it. The solution lies in Australians offering loving friendship to those in need.

"Many Australians find it embarrassing, uncomfortable or even confronting to see homeless people on the streets," Archbishop Costelloe writes.

"But we encourage all who are baptised to, instead, offer loving friendship to people on the edge of society.

"Instead of walking by and not noticing the plight of our neighbours, pay attention to them and their plight, listen to their stories, and serve them with the love we learn from Jesus."

The statement includes first-hand accounts of people struggling with mental-ill health and homelessness.

Tasmanian dad Michael turned his life around with the help of the Society of St Vincent de Paul.

"My family couldn't cope with my drug abuse, and I landed up on the streets. I slept wherever I could find a place. It was tough, scary and very lonely," Michael recounted. "My life has turned around ... I wake up every morning with a smile on my face. My daughter says that I am shining!"

An estimated 280,000 people access homelessness services each year, with one in three having a current mental health issue. The statement lists some of the ways that Catholic entities are engaging with the crisis.

Australians are encouraged to act, such as working with local government councils on ways to address homelessness and mental health, helping street van ministries and advocating to state and federal MPs about better policies.

Bishops Commission for Social Justice, Mission and Service chair, Bishop Tim Harris, said there was a clear message in the statement.

"We want to encourage Australians to notice homeless people in their communities, to take every chance to listen to their stories and understand what their lives are like," Bishop Harris said.

"To listen to their hopes and dreams, and to truly serve them with love and humility."



FIRST READING

Sirach 3:17-20, 28-29

My son, be gentle in carrying out your business, and you will be better loved than a lavish giver. The greater you are, the more you should behave humbly, and then you will find favour with the Lord; for great though the power of the Lord is, he accepts the homage of the humble. There is no cure for the proud man's malady, since an evil growth has taken root in him. The heart of a sensible man will reflect on parables, an attentive ear is the sage's dream.

(R.) God, in your goodness, you have made a home for the poor.

- The just shall rejoice at the presence of God, they shall exult and dance for joy.

But what you have come to is Mount Zion and the city of the living God, the heavenly Jerusalem where the millions of angels have gathered for the festival, with the whole Church in which everyone is a 'first-born son' and a citizen of heaven. You have come to God himself, the supreme Judge, and been placed with spirits of the saints who have been made perfect; and to Jesus, the mediator who brings a new covenant.

On a sabbath day Jesus had gone for a meal to the house of one of the leading Pharisees; and they watched him closely. He then told the guests a parable, because he had noticed how they picked the places of honour. He said this, 'When someone invites you to a wedding feast, do not take your seat in the place of honour. A more distinguished person than you may have been invited, and the person who invited you both may come and say. "Give up your place to this man." And then, to your embarrassment, you would have to go and take the lowest place. No; when you are a guest, make your way to the lowest place and sit there, so that, when your host comes, he may say, "My friend, move up higher." In that way, everyone with you at the table will see you honoured. For everyone who exalts himself will be humbled, and the man who humbles himself will be exalted.' Then he said to his host, 'When you give a lunch or a dinner, do not ask your friends, brothers, relations or rich neighbours, for fear they repay your courtesy by inviting you in return. No; when you have a party, invite the poor, the crippled, the lame, the blind; that they cannot pay you back means that you are





